This autumn's exhibition programme also includes a chance to see the museum's latest

acquisitions of drawings and prints (opens 20 October), explore light and dark in "Lumiere", an exhibition of lithographs by Odilon Redon (opens 22 September) and look at the work of John Singer Sargent, Walter Sickert and Stanley Spencer (opens 8 December).

We're busy working on our Ancient Greek galleries but they will remain closed until early 2010. Until then we'll be continuing to offer a session to KS 2 groups which explores the influence of the Ancient Greeks on artists and architecture using the building and Renaissance paintings.

## casestudy



After looking at 14th century Italian paintings during a recent museum visit, Year 5 children from St Mary's C of E Primary School were fascinated by the precious lapis lazuli which artists used to make the blue of The Virgin Mary's dress.

Back at school, the children created their own pieces of lapis with stones and paint, plotted how far the lapis had to travel from Afghanistan to Italy and imagined the journey. They used mapping skills to find out where other types of stone might come from and did experiments creating paint from a variety of pigments and media. A poem by Adrian Mitchell "A Speck Speaks" helped inspire the children to write their own poems about lapis lazuli.

When we started I was thinking of art objectives because we were going to an art gallery and then we linked in lots of history objectives. But the thing that's really amazed me is all the cross-curricular links we've been able to make... when I sat down and looked at all the things we've done, we've actually covered a huge amount of the primary curriculum just through a few museum visits.
